And one moment of understanding can lead on to another in a domino effect.

But don't get disheartened if you are reading and the words are just not "doing it" for you – pray with God about it, talk with friends about it – understanding comes from the most unexpected places sometimes and what joy there is when it does!

I hope this prayer encourages you to read with your Bible a bit more during these ongoing difficult times. I am praying this prayer all this week, to help me find a closer relationship with the texts (particularly those I find difficult or challenging) and to remind me that God is with me in my reading.

It's important to remember that the sacred Scriptures also shape and form us, and inform us, of how to live more closely in God's love and light, how to live and love each other. This special book contains an incredible toolkit that, coupled with prayer will give us guidance and everything we need to form a firm foundation in what it means to be a child of a loving and living God.
